Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

Fidelity Small Cap America Class ("Class") invests substantially all of its assets in units of its underlying fund, Fidelity Small Cap America Fund ("Underlying Fund").

Effective May 1, 2011, Steve MacMillan, former Team Canada analyst responsible for coverage of banks and diversified financials, assumed portfolio management of Fidelity Small Cap America Fund. Mr. MacMillan has taken over the portfolio from co-managers Forrest St. Clair and Ethan Hugo.

Fidelity Small Cap America Class, Series B, returned 12.5% for the six-month period ended May 31, 2011. The net returns of other series of this Class are similar to those of Series B, except for differences attributable to expense structures. By way of comparison, the S&P 500 Index, broadly representative of the U.S. equity market, returned 8.5% (in Canadian dollar terms).

The Class' benchmark, the Russell 2000 Index, returned 10.7% for the six-month period under review. The Class' outperformance of the benchmark was primarily attributable to security selection in the health care sector. At the end of the review period, the Underlying Fund had an exposure of 18.9% to health care stocks, compared with the benchmark weighting of 13.1%.

During the review period, U.S. equities gained as fears of a double dip waned and economic data suggested that the U.S. economy was on a firmer footing. Oil and other commodities continued to rise, boosting resource stocks. In Asia (ex Japan), however, equities were subdued, due to rising inflation and monetary tightening measures by central banks. Toward the middle of the period, political turmoil in the Middle East and North Africa led to a surge in oil prices, raising concerns about further tightening in developing economies. With the impact of the earthquake in Japan, investors grew wary of riskier assets, leading to a rise in volatility. The renewed debt crisis in Greece sparked fears about further deterioration in the European sovereign debt situation.

During the review period, the Underlying Fund's exposures to defensive sectors such as health care, consumer staples and utilities were increased. In the health care sector, exposure was increased to attractively valued companies in the health care equipment and supplies industry. However, the Underlying Fund had no exposure to the pharmaceutical, biotechnology and life sciences industries at the end of the period. In the consumer staples sector, the Underlying Fund's exposure to select companies that are related to consumer and personal care products was increased, owing to improving operating margins. The Underlying Fund's exposure to cash was increased during the period, while exposure to the energy, financials and telecommunication services sectors was decreased. In financials, the Underlying Fund remains underweight in commercial banks and REITs and overweight in capital markets companies. In capital markets, the portfolio owns companies that have improving fundamentals and that are less exposed to credit risk. Several of these companies would also be beneficiaries of rising interest rates.

Recent Developments

Steve MacMillan believes that given the inefficiency of markets, competitive long-term returns are achieved by identifying high-quality stocks at attractive valuations and holding them for the long term. He believes that sound fundamentals drive stock prices over time. His risk framework is rooted in absolute volatility rather than volatility relative to the overall market. Mr. MacMillan will focus on companies with sustainable, lower-volatility business models rather than lower-quality, higher-risk areas of the market, such as biotechnology or semiconductors.

During the four weeks since Mr. MacMillan assumed responsibility for the portfolio, he has been reducing the number of stocks significantly, aiming for a concentrated fund with around 40 stocks. He looks for sustainable businesses with high return on equity and high free-cash flows that he can own for a period of three to five years. The manager's approach should result in a fund with low portfolio turnover and significant downside protection.

Independent Review Committee

Susan E.C. Mey retired from the Independent Review Committee on February 23, 2011, and Helen Meyer was appointed on the same date for a term of three years.

Accounting Standards

Changeover to International Financial Reporting Standards

The Canadian Accounting Standards Board (AcSB) of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants (CICA) had planned to adopt International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS), as published by the International Accounting Standards Board, effective January 1, 2011. In January 2011, the AcSB deferred the adoption of IFRS for investment companies, which include investment funds. Investment companies may continue to apply existing GAAP standards until fiscal years beginning on or after January 1, 2013.

The manager is reviewing and developing a plan to meet the above timetable for changeover to IFRS. The impact of IFRS on accounting policies and implementation decisions will mainly be in the areas of presentations and disclosures in the financial statements of the Class. Currently, two significant areas that may impact the presentation are IAS 32 Financial Instruments: Presentation, and IAS 27 Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements. The manager is currently assessing the Class' shareholder structure and investments to determine the impact of these standards. The manager has currently not identified any changes that will impact net asset value per share (NAVPS) as a result of the changeover to IFRS. However, this present determination is subject to change resulting from the issuance of new standards or new interpretations of existing standards.

Related Party Transactions

Manager and Portfolio Adviser

The Class is managed by Fidelity Investments Canada ULC (Fidelity). Fidelity is a wholly-owned subsidiary of FMR LLC. FMR LLC is the parent company of a group of subsidiaries collectively known as Fidelity Investments.

Fidelity provides or arranges for the provision of all general management and administrative services required by the Class in its day-to-day operations, including providing or arranging the provision of investment advice, establishment of brokerage arrangements relating to the purchase and sale of the investment portfolio, bookkeeping, record-keeping and other administrative services for the Class.

The Class' portfolio adviser is Fidelity and it provides investment advisory services to the Class.

As a result of providing investment advisory and management services, Fidelity receives a monthly management fee, based on the average net assets of each Series, calculated daily and payable monthly. The Class paid Fidelity management fees of \$72,000 for the period ended May 31, 2011.

Administration Fee

Fidelity charges the Class a fixed administration fee in place of certain variable expenses. Fidelity, in turn, pays all of the operating expenses of the Class, other than certain specified class costs (e.g. the fees and expenses of the Independent Review Committee, taxes, brokerage commissions and interest charges). The Class pays an annual rate, which is calculated on a tiered basis, based on the average net assets of each Series. The Class paid Fidelity administration fees of \$15,000 for the period ended May 31, 2011.

Fidelity uses these management fees to pay for sales and trailing commissions to registered dealers on the distribution of the Class shares, as well as for general investment management and administration expenses.

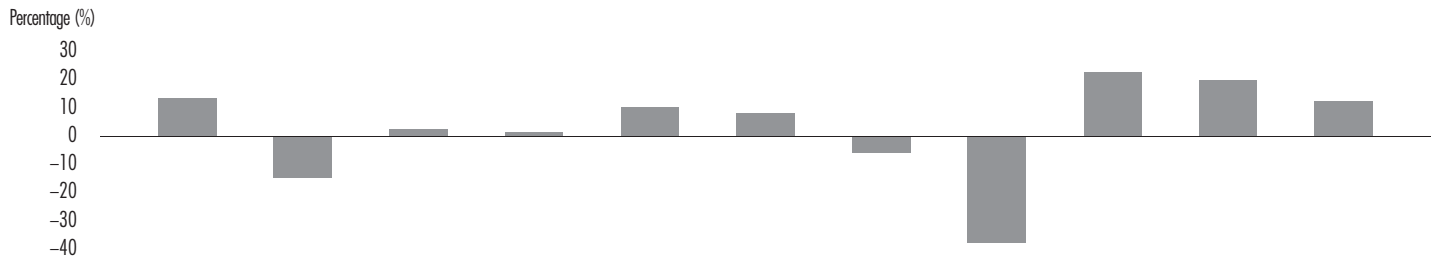

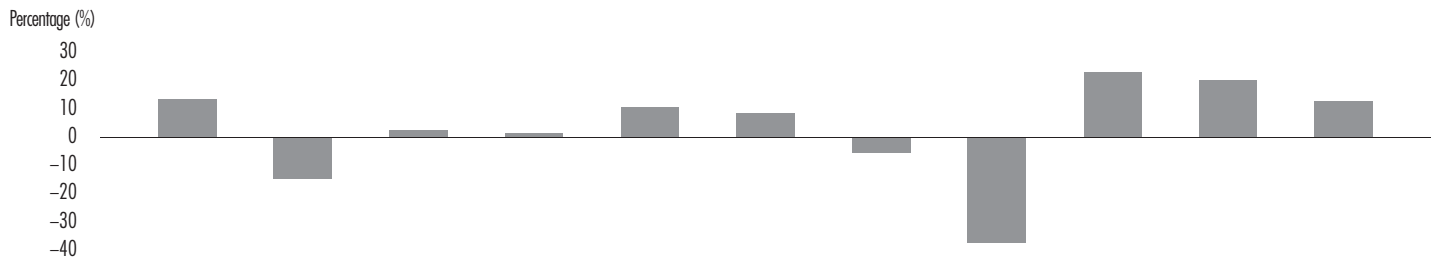

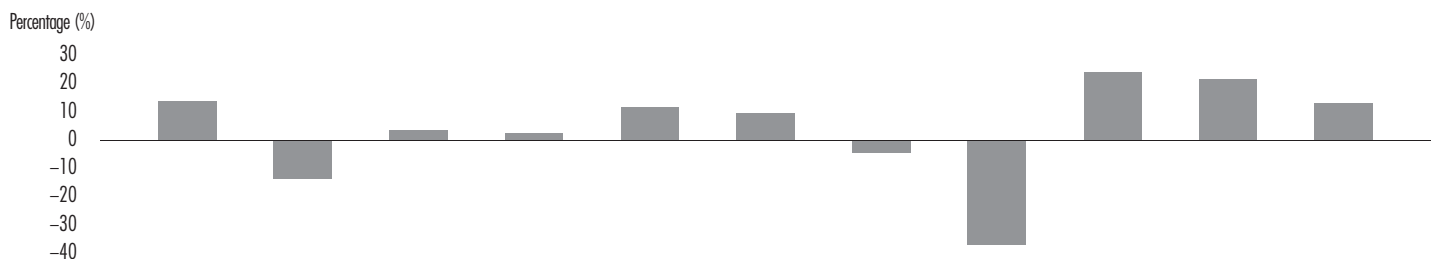
